Beekeeping notes for August ~ written by Pat Allen

You should do a careful check for disease this month to make sure your bees are healthy going into winter. Read your books or the BeeBase web-site guidance on how to shake the frame to clear the bees so you can see all the brood cells. Check what you see against the pictures in the guidance. If you are unsure about what you see, check with your divisional contacts. There are contact details in your members information pack.

The nectar flow is slowing and will probably stop altogether some time this month, so remove the last of the honey crop by the end of this month. Leave the bees enough stores to survive until you feed them though, don't take it all. Give them the wet supers back to clean up (above the crownboard).

Assess the colonies and decide which ones you want to overwinter. Don't waste time and money feeding a colony that is unlikely to survive the winter, unite it instead with a strong one.

Once you have removed the honey you can treat against varroa. Remember when treating or feeding to have the floor insert in and any access to the underside of the mesh blocked off. If you are unsure what to do, talk to your mentor.

KEITH SPARLING - OSTEOPATH 3rd July 2015

Our talk from Keith was very informative and helpful. Keith is the brother of one of our members and is a practicing osteopath in Brentwood. He agreed to do a talk on lifting and carrying for bee keepers.

Keith brought a plastic replica of a spine with him and explained all the different



problems that can occur if you lift or carry in an incorrect manner, and the detrimental effect it will have on your spine over the years. He told us that the replica spine was the third one he had in his 30 years as an osteopath and that was proof of all the times he had explained to his patients what was happening to their spine and the damage it causes which is indicative of damage that would happen to a real spine over a space of time with incorrect lifting and carrying.

Osteopaths treat the whole body and involves osteopathic manipulation therapy. Using manipulative therapy rather than just drugs helps the body to treat the condition and repair an injury itself.

Osteopaths are trained to use their hands to diagnose a problem and to relieve pain and help to balance muscles and tissues to assist the body to return it to its own natural state.

A very common cause of back pain is by lifting badly. Keith showed us the best way to lift heavy supers by holding them close to the body and to be aware of the height and distance we are lifting from. Also to be mindful of when putting down full supers how it will affect our backs when picking them up again. Thereby placing them in a much more back friendly place i.e. on something higher up so that you do not have to bend right down again to lift a full super from ground level.

Keith showed us some simple exercises that would help our backs and some exercises to prepare us for lifting and carrying.

The talk was very well attended and most informative and helpful. The feedback from members was very positive and much was gained from Keith's talk.
