Beekeeping notes for February ~ written by Pat Allen

This has been an extraordinary winter. We have finally had a cold spell, which is good, but the weather is warming up again as I write these notes. However, it is very unlikely that February will be warm enough to open the hives for inspection of frames. You may want to put on a small patty of fondant and/or pollen, but do not disturb the bees more than that.

With the mild weather, there may have been brood all through, and as a result the varroa population may be significant. It would be wise to give your bees a varroa treatment at the end of February or in early March — even if you used oxalic acid earlier on (oxalic acid does not kill varroa in sealed brood cells). One tray of Apiguard should be enough at this time of year. Remember to put the floor insert in when treating.

Get your spare equipment ready, you will be needing it soon enough.
