September Beekeeping Notes - written by Pat Allen

This is a **very important month** for your bees because their winter survival can depend on your actions.

All the honey should be off by now and varroa treatment underway or finished. Don't forget you must record your treatments and keep the records for five years.

If the bees do not have enough stores to get them through winter then top them up with heavy syrup (1kg sugar: 600ml water). Make sure the floor insert is in during feeding if you have mesh floors, to prevent robbing through the mesh. Each colony will need 20–25 kgs stores to get through and as a guide a National brood frame can hold 2.5kgs. Get the feeding finished well before the end of September to ensure the bees can evaporate the syrup down to the water content they need for storage.

When feeding and treating are finished, if you are wintering on National brood and a super, put the super underneath the brood box (remember to cut off any brace comb on the bottom of the brood frames). **Remove the queen excluder.** Floor inserts should be removed and left out for the winter and the holes in the crownboard covered (bottom ventilation is enough). Count the varroa and record the numbers.

Disease Inspection at the Teaching Apiary – 3rd August 2017

Members were put into groups of 6 per hive with an experienced bee keeper for instruction.

Firstly, block the hive entrance with cut grass; this makes it easier to take approximately 40 bees as a sample. The inspection carried out in the brood is best conducted in a gentle manner with no sudden jerky movements.





Next, shake the bees off from each frame, ensuring that the queen is not shaken outside the hive by mistake and taking care not to damage any larvae or stores. Check the amount of stores, drawn comb, the condition of the larvae, sealed brood and whether the bees have adequate room.

When the inspection of the hive is completed, remove the grass from the entrance. Bees will have returned to the hive entrance making it easier for the beekeeper to collect the bees they are taking to use for dissection purposes, after they have been frozen in the freezer.


