The weather was good to us and the bees behaved beautifully. Two demonstrations were given — a Bailey Comb Change, and a Shook Swarm. The audience was not large, but it was good to see some very young beekeepers there. After the demos there were many questions and hopefully everyone learned something that can help their bees next season. Changing the combs really perks the bees up and doing a Bailey Comb Change every two or three years on each colony is recommended to reduce the build-up of pathogens in the comb.

August Beekeeping Notes:

The season is coming to an end now and August is a good month to do a dedicated disease inspection. You will need to shake all the bees off each frame as you go through so that you can see every cell. Read your books to remind yourself of the procedure. If anything looks wrong, get a second opinion or contact the Bee Inspector (details in *The Essex Beekeeper* magazine).

Assess your colonies and decide which ones you want to overwinter. It is not worth feeding and treating a colony that is unlikely to survive the winter, it is better to unite it to a strong one. You can make up the loss next spring when the colony expands.

Any honey you want for yourself should be taken off by the end of the month, but don't take it all. Give the bees back the extracted supers for a week (over the crownboard) and then remove them and store them for winter.



Then it is time to feed and to treat against varroa. This autumn the bulk buy will be of MAQS and if you want to use this, then get your order in straight away (see note elsewhere in the newsletter). You can feed and treat this month or in September, but do not leave it any later. Remember that the floor insert must be in while treating and feeding.
