August Beekeeping Notes

August is a good month to do a dedicated disease inspection. It is especially important this year because there is an outbreak of European Foul Brood in our area at the moment. Many of us have had an alert from the NBU of EFB within 3km of our apiaries. Be extra careful about apiary hygiene and make sure you clean your tools (hot water, washing up liquid, washing soda crystals). Clean your hive tool and gloves between each colony. If anything does not look right, contact the Bee Inspector (see *The Essex Beekeeper* for contacts), and our local Disease Liaison Officers or your mentor.



If you are not already registered on BeeBase, then do it straight away. It is a condition of EBKA membership to be registered and it means you will get alerts about disease outbreaks, etc.

August is also good for uniting colonies and requeening. You only want to put strong healthy colonies into winter. Get any honey you want to take off the hives before the end of the month, but leave some for the bees. Let the bees clean up the extracted supers (over the crownboard), then remove them and store them for winter.



Then it is time to treat against Varroa. You can feed this month too, or next month, but the earlier the better.

Remember that the **floor insert must be in** while treating and feeding.
