WHAT THE BOOKS DON'T TELL YOU AND WHY BEES CHANGE THEIR MINDS

Buckfast Abbey Bee Keepers – 5th November 2020

We believe a lot of statements we hear that actually are not true i.e. if holly has a lot of berries it will be a cold winter – this is not true. Likewise, with all the information we read or hear about bees.

A lot of ideas about why and how the bees swarm are not necessarily true, neither are various ideas about the queen and the temper of the bees depending on the queens' temper. Don't believe everything you see and hear on YouTube or from books. It is better to observe your own bees and make your own mind up.

Another misconception is that a bad-tempered colony will produce more honey and if you harvest queen cells from a colony preparing to swarm the colony will be swarmy.

Some other incorrect saying about bees are:

Superseding cells are always on the surface of the comb rather than the edge.

Varroa always infests drone brood rather than infesting worker brood.

Therefore, it is best to observe your own bees as they all have a mind of their own and do not necessarily behave to form. After all they don't read the same books as we do!

This is a good month to give your bees oxalic treatment if you think they still have varroa – between Christmas and New Year is good when the weather is pretty cold. This will ensure minimum brood in the hives, which is what you want for oxalic treatment.

Check the hives are upright and not under attack from woodpeckers. Apart from that take the opportunity to plan for next year.
