MARCH Beekeeping Notes

If you have not yet done so, remove those Mouseguards! The bees need free access now to bring in pollen and remove the dead bodies and Mouseguards can make this difficult for them.

Remember that March is a most dangerous month for bees. Cold weather can restrict their flying, yet they need to get out to forage. Old bees are dying but they need bees to look after the new brood. A difficult balance for them. Do have a **very quick** inspection if the weather is above 14°C and feed if really necessary, but don't restrict the queen's space for laying, you want them to build up.

If you wintered with super under brood box, then towards the end of the month swap them round and put in the queen excluder. If the colony is strong, put another super on top above the crownboard (i.e. crownboard with a hole!). The bees will go into it if they need more space, and you can remove the crownboard then.

Nature Recovery In Practice, 1st February 2024. Chris Bawtree

Ground Control is the largest commercial landscaping company in the UK, care of the environment is the core of their business. They give 5% of all their profits to the Evergreen Fund, which was set up in 2020. The Evergreen Fund invests in green equity, planting of trees, re-investing profits and are involved with land for nature projects.

In 2021 they purchased 298 acres of woodland in North Essex and in 2023 they purchased 100 acres of farmland to maximise the environmental possibilities.

Wildfell Centre for Environmental Recovery is a 398 acre site in Braintree. It consists of arable land, woodland, grassland, hedgerows, ponds, ditches and a river corridor. It involves the local community, Essex County, Braintree District and Wethersfield, Parish Councils, the Forestry Commission, Essex Wildlife Trust, Environmental Agency, RSPB, Farming & Wildlife Advisory Group and other wildlife groups. It has at its centre work on restoration, on plants, fungi and pollinators.

They also conduct a surveys of protected species; Bats, birds, great crested newt, reptiles, otters, water voles, mammals, pollinators and flora, soil survey and above ground biomass surveys.

The Wildfell Centre has sightings of seven species of bats, the great crested newt, brown hare, fox and weasel, 52 species of birds, red kite, barn owl, skylark, otters, rare bees and wasps.

Pollinators sighted are large headed resin bee, large meadow and bryony mining bees, 5 banded weevil wasps, 8 species bumblebee. 11 species solitary bee, 7 species solitary wasp, 17 species butterfly and the European hornet.

Ground Control are actively involved with restoring ponds, and have found that once cleared and restored there are seeds and plants in the depths that have not flowered for 50 years, and are capable of springing to life again. As well as restoring three ponds they've also managed to create 11 new ponds, and have been busy with hedgerow planting and woodland grass seeding.

The plan is now to start orchard planting, and to continue with the hedgerow planting, to complete a workshop and barn, working with the establishing habitat and managing it, and to create volunteer opportunities. In the future they want to arrange school visits to interest the children in this vital work. Their aim is to have an impact on influencing others to work towards natures recovery.

Updated Advice on using Asian Hornet traps

Previously we have recommended placing sticks or stones into traps to reduce by kill. We would now recommend a trap to have a jay cloth or similar in which soaks up virtually all bait. 6mm Holes should be drilled/melted into the sides near the top to allow by catch to escape. New definitions for most traps as follows, a monitoring trap is one which catches the target insect. A monitoring station allows any insect to visit and leave. Spring queen trapping should be done with monitoring traps as in the attached picture. Traps should be visited as often as possible and ideally every day to release any bycatch which are trapped. Any AH should be bagged and frozen in the trap if necessary for at least 24hrs. Alert the AH teams and also the NBU via the Asian hornet watch app.

Committee matters:

The committee met on Thursday 29th February and as usual there was much to discuss.

We have a new education officer, Zakir Bikhan, who will be taking on the role of organising the beginners' course, supported by the tutors. Garry Furnell has volunteered to run the two taster sessions, held in July. The dates for these two sessions will be confirmed soon and details put on the website. So if you know anyone who might be interested, do pass on the details.

The spread of the Asian Hornet is a top priority to all beekeepers. The committee has been discussing this and Terry, our AH coordinator, has brought to our attention the huge surveillance operation that Dover and District Beekeepers' Association have been undertaking and continue to do so this year. There have been 52 AH nests cleared in Kent so far. The majority in the Dover and District's area, over 10 of these were not at or near an apiary

Their plan is to section the whole of their area, dividing a map into 1km squares. With members participation, do a sweep through the area at certain times. Members will be allocated a grid square, in their neighbourhood or adjoining it. Each will be given 5 traps [slightly different model, new design to protect European hornets] to spread around in their km square.

Traps will be approximately 500 – 700m apart. Attractant will be supplied.

These traps will **not** need to be moved about, the spacing should ensure random AH will find them by scent

This will start in February, 10°C temperature is needed for the Queens to start to move.

There will be a finite number of Queens to be caught, and they will be supported by NBU.

Members are spending a lot of their own time doing this to provide front line protection from the AH. The area they cover is from Hythe all the way to Sandwich Bay, a considerable length of coastline. Buying and putting up this many traps is quite expensive. They are carrying out a very comprehensive trapping and monitoring drive and the committee has discussed sending a donation to them to help them with the large expense. I contacted them at the weekend to offer a donation to help cover some of their expenses. They thanked me very much, but suggested that we would also need considerable funds in the fight against the AH. They have very kindly given us some comprehensive information regarding the AH and what they have done so far, with details of making traps, labels for the traps and baits. The committee will be passing on any important information in due course. They really are providing a formidable line of protection for the UK from the AH.
