#### **MARCH Beekeeping Notes**

Mouseguards should be **OFF** by now! They can knock precious pollen off the bees' legs.

MARCH is a dangerous month for the bees. Flying time may be limited but they need to forage. Old bees are dying and there is new brood to look after. Let's hope the weather co-operates and we have a sunny, warm spring. You can have a **very quick** inspection if the temperature is above 14°C, and feed if really necessary but don't restrict the queen's space for laying, you want them to build up.

If you wintered with a super under the brood box, swap the boxes back into the normal configuration towards the end of the month, and put the queen excluder above the brood. If the colony is strong, give them another super above the crownboard (crownboard with a hole!). If the bees need the space they will go into the super and you can then remove the crownboard.

If you made up some frames, without wax, now is the time to put in the foundation, so that you are ready to remove old combs and for the colonies to expand.

#### **Beware of Winter Woodpecker Damage!**

Damage to hives from the green woodpecker can be severe and can cause the death of a colony if swift action is not taken to repair the damage. If you think that there may be woodpeckers around your apiary be sure to put on some form of protection for the winter. Chicken wire bent around the entire hive is a well used deterrent, or if you have run out of chicken wire, you could try cutting a black bin liner into strips and keeping in place with a brick at the top of your hive! Unfortunately due to ill health, Filippo was unable to attend to this hive and get it completely ready for winter, and the woodpecker took advantage of this and made a good job of his attack.





Once the damage was found on the softer parts of several other hives, some black gaffer tape was put over as an emergency repair. You can see from the photos (on the next page) that the woodpecker came back and got through the tape. The bees are still in residence and are now being fed to help them survive.

Another possible hive protection is the green netting that is used to surround scaffolding to stop the dust and dirt escaping. This can be stapled around the hive and is easier to handle and to store than chicken wire.

#### Let Alone Gardening, Tony Gunton 6th February 2025

'Let alone gardening' is letting nature do its own work. Creating healthy soil will result in healthy plants. We need to maintain a natural stability, halting factors that disturb the balance of the soil, i.e. poisonous sprays etc. Every time you intervene with your garden it interferes with wildlife. If you are trying to create a wildflower meadow you need to keep an eye on the wild plants to make sure some do not take completely overtake destroying other varieties. You want to create a mixture of wildlife in your garden, diversity depends on a mosaic of habitat.

Wild meadows are actually created by humans. The cutting of hay, grazing or doing both which allows wildflowers to grow to create the nutrients that have been taken out of the earth and supporting biodiversity to improve the quality of the soil. It also is very important for pollinators.

The countryside and our gardens are awash with nutrients, the nitrogen from cars goes into the earth and has a direct effect of the plants, sometimes it will make some species of plants grow faster.

Natural native plants are preferable for our gardens. Double headed roses have flower heads that are too tight for the insects to get to the nectar. Also, native plants are usually better equipped for our climate, and are more resilient to our pests. These plants would have evolved naturally in the area protecting the natural balance of our environment.

Tony gave us a good insight into 'let alone gardening' with many photographs of his own garden, showing how well the plants were thriving.
